**Oval Beach Trespassing** 

It is my understanding that the current issue consists of beachgoers conducting activities to include walking, lounging, and building campfires, etc. upon private property that borders Lake Michigan.

#### Is a new trespass ordinance required?

The City should amend its trespassing ordinance for clarification. State law provides two applicable criminal trespass statutes MCL 750.552 and MCL 324.73102(1); however, a revised ordinance would allow for more effective municipal prosecution.

#### MCL 750.552(a) and (b) prohibits a person from:

Enter[ing] the lands or premises of another without lawful authority after having been forbidden [emphasis added] to do so by the owner or occupant or the agent of the owner or occupant [, or] [r]emaining without lawful authority on the land or premises of another after being notified to depart [emphasis added] by the owner or occupant or the agent of the owner or occupant.

#### MCL 324.73102(1) prohibits a person from:

[E]nter[ing] or remain[ing] upon the property of another person, other than farm property or a wooded area connected to farm property, to engage in any recreational activity or trapping on that property without the consent of the owner or his or her lessee or agent, if [...] [t]he property is posted in a conspicuous manner against entry. The minimum letter height on the posting signs shall be 1 inch. Each posting sign shall be not less than 50 square inches, and the signs shall be spaced to enable a person to observe not less than 1 sign at any point of entry upon the property.

A barrier to efficient enforcement in MCL 750.552(a) and (b) is the requirement for notification by the "by the owner or occupant or the agent of the owner or occupant" forbidding the trespassory conduct. Signage is not sufficient to provide requisite notification under the statute. In MCL 324.73102(1)(b), however, signage provides notice sufficient for prosecution. Unlike the majority of State penal statutes, MCL 324.73102(1)(b) is enforceable by municipal prosecution, MCL 324.73108; however, in practice, violations written under MCL 324.73108

will most likely be prosecuted by the State. A corresponding ordinance would allow the City to, practically speaking, take a more active role in prosecution.

The current trespass ordinance is found in Title XIII, Chapter 132, § 132.03 of the City of Saugatuck Code of Ordinances (Code). The language is confusing and complicated, hindering efficient prosecution. Currently the language reads:

Any person who shall willfully enter upon the lands or premises of another without lawful authority, after having been forbidden so to do, or after the lands or premises have been previously posted with a conspicuous notice forbidding any trespass thereon by the owner or occupant, or agent or servant of the owner or occupant, or any person being upon the land or premises of another, upon being notified to depart therefrom by the owner or occupant, or agent or servant of either, who, without lawful authority, neglects or refuses to depart therefrom, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

The proposed revision would mirror the two state statutes referenced earlier and would provide:

- (A) Unless otherwise authorized or provided by law, no person shall:
- (1) enter onto the lands or premises of another after having been forbidden to do so by the owner or occupant or the agent of the owner,
- (2) remain on the lands or premises of another after having been notified to depart by the owner or occupant or the agent of the owner or occupant,
- (3) enter onto the lands or premises of another where the property is fenced or enclosed and is maintained in such a manner as to exclude intruders, or
- (4) enter onto the lands or premises of another where the property is posted in a conspicuous manner against entry. The minimum letter height on the posting signs shall be one inch. Each posting sign shall be not less than 50 square inches, and the signs shall be spaced to enable a person to observe not less than 1 sign at any point of entry upon the property.
  - (B) Penalty. See § 10.99

A copy of the proposed revised ordinance is attached for consideration by the City Council.

Can MCL 750.552, MCL 324.73102(1), or the proposed ordinance be used to prosecute beachgoers conducting activities to include walking, lounging, and building campfires etc. upon private property that boarders Lake Michigan.

It is my opinion that the applicable statutes as well as the proposed ordinance can be used to prosecute beach goers provided their activities extend *landward* of the *ordinary high water* mark.<sup>1</sup>

The common law public trust doctrine applies to the Great Lakes. Glass v Goeckel, 473 Mich 667, 678; 703 NW2d 58 (2005). "[T]he state, as sovereign, has an obligation to protect and preserve the waters of the Great Lakes and the lands beneath them for the public. The state serves, in effect, as the trustee of public rights in the great Lake for fishing, hunting, and [.... navigation] for commerce or pleasure." Id. at 679. Pursuant to the public trust doctrine, when the state conveyed beachfront property to private individuals that conveyance was subject to the public trust. See Id. at 674. Essentially, even though the property owner has title to the water's edge the public still has some limited rights to use the property.

The public trust, or area in which the public may exercise use of the property, extends from the lake to the ordinary high water mark. *Id.* at 687. The ordinary high water mark is defined as:

[T]he point on the bank or shore up to which the presence and action of the water is so continuous as to leave a distinct mark either by erosion, destruction of terrestrial vegetation, or other easily recognized characteristic. And where the bank or shore at any particular place is of such a character that is impossible or difficult to ascertain where the point of ordinary high-water mark is, recourse may be had to other places on the bank or shore of the same stream or lake to determine whether a given stage of water is above or below ordinary high-water mark.

#### *Id.* at 686 (citation omitted)

The public does not have an unlimited right to access private land below the ordinary high water mark, and not all activity is permitted within the zone of the public trust. <sup>2</sup> *Id.* at 697. The traditional rights of the public protected under the public trust doctrine are "fishing, hunting, and navigation for commerce or pleasure," as well as activities inherent in those rights. *Id.* at 695-96. *See also Id.* stating "Indeed, other courts have recognized a "right of passage" as protected with their public trust. See *Town of Orange v. Resnick*, 94 Conn. 573, 578, 109 A. 864 (1920) (listing as public rights "fishing, boating, hunting, bathing, taking shellfish, gathering seaweed, cutting sedge and ... passing and repassing"); *Arnold v. Mundy*, 6 N.J.L. 1, 12 (1821) (reserving to the public the use of waters for "purposes of passing and repassing, navigation, fishing, fowling, [and] sustenance")."

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Given the fluid nature of the ordinary high water mark, appropriate prudence should be exercised prior to making an arrest or issuing a citation.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> The doctrine of public trust does not prohibit prosecution for other crimes such as under § 131.02 Deliberate Annoyance of Others, or MCL 750.170 Disturbing the Peace.

While it is clear that walking is permitted below the ordinary high water mark, the law is less clear as to other activities such as picnicking or sunbathing. However, given the necessity for rest during the conduct of traditionally protected activities it is possible the court would find them permissible as well. Enforcement would be easier and more consistent if all traditional beach activities were permitted within the zone of public trust; i.e. lakeward of the ordinary high watermark. Accordingly, it is recommended that prosecution under the statutes or ordinance be restricted to activities taking place above the ordinary high water mark, and that any signage comply with the requirements of MCL 324.73102(1) and the proposed ordinance.<sup>3</sup>

Proposed verbiage for signage is below.

#### NO TRESPASSING LEAVING PUBLIC BEACH

Public prohibited from area landward of ordinary high watermark PENALTY: Misdemeanor up to 90 days jail and/ or \$500 City of Saugatuck Code of Ordinances Title XIII, Chapter 132, § 132.03; MCL 324.73102(1); MCL 750.552(a) and (b)

As it relates to environmental concerns, it does not appear any permits are needed for signage under the Department of Environmental Quality Water Resource Division Part 17 Soil Erosion and Sedimentation Control. Signage complying MCL 324.73102(1) and the proposed ordinance fall under Permit Exemptions and Waivers R323.1705(c) "[a]n earth change of a minor nature that is stabilized within 24 hours of the initial earth disturbance and that will not contribute sediment to lakes or streams."

(A) Unless otherwise authorized or provided by law, no person shall:
(1) enter onto the lands or premises of another after having been forbidden to do so by the owner or occupant or the agent of the owner,
(2) remain on the lands or premises of another after having been notified to depart by the owner or occupant or the agent of the owner or occupant,
(3) enter onto the lands or premises of another where the property is fenced or enclosed and is maintained in such a manner as to exclude intruders, or
(4) enter onto the lands or premises of another where the property is posted in a conspicuous manner against entry. The minimum letter height on the posting signs shall be one inch. Each posting sign shall be not less than 50 square inches, and the signs shall be spaced to enable a person to observe not less than 1 sign at any point of entry upon the property.
(B) Penalty. See § 10.99
Section 2. <u>Effective Date</u> . This Ordinance shall become effective upon its publication unless otherwise provided by law.

## From the Board...

The STFD Board proposes the following budget for the Fiscal Year 2019/2020 to the City of Saugatuck, Saugatuck Township and the City of the Village of Douglas. The budget consists of a millage of 2.20 mills levied against the real taxable value of the district.

The Fire District is experiencing a significant increase in demands for emergency public safety incident response and services. While education and fire prevention efforts have assisted in reducing fire calls by 19% since 2004, there has been a 82% increase in call volume for total calls, including a 29% increase in medical calls and a 408% increase in other calls (overpressure. explosion, overheat, hazardous conditions, service calls, good intent, false alarms and severe weather).

The STFD Board's goal is to maintain the high level of public safety for the

benefit of our residents. We are requesting a modest increase of 2 tenths (.2) of a mill. The 2 tenths (.2) will be used to provide a stipend for paid-on-call

firefighters and EMS personnel and also adding full time firefighter/EMS position to meet the increasing demands for public safety.

The District is experiencing continued increased costs for equipment maintenance, repair, and replacement. See further details in on pages 10-11. Included in the packet is a copy of the fiscal year 2019/2020 Operating and Capital Budget. (A proposed capital replacement schedule for the next ten years is also available from Fire Chief Janik. This schedule is followed by a yearly estimate of needed capital improvements).

The STFD Board is requesting the City of Saugatuck, Saugatuck Township and the City of the Village of Douglas to review and approve this proposed budget during their next scheduled board meetings. The Fire Board will hold a public hearing on this proposed budget on June 17, 2019 at 4:00 PM at Saugatuck Township Fire District building located at 3342 Blue Star Highway, Saugatuck, Michigan.

Dear Mr. Muncey:

This Letter of Understanding ("Letter") is intended to memorialize the City of Saugatuck's understanding with respect to the Saugatuck Douglas Area Business Association's ("Applicant') proposal to hold, operate and conduct a Free Music in the Park event within the City on June 12, 19, 26, July 3, 10, 17, 24, 31 and August 7, 14, 21, 28 ("Event").

The Special Event Application and associated materials dated May 24, 2019 (collectively, the "Application") to the City which has been reviewed by the City Council. After due consideration, the City Council has approved that Application subject to Applicant's willingness to sign this Letter. This Letter shall be construed to incorporate and include the Application as well as the materials attached thereto. In the event of a conflict between the terms of this Letter and the Application, the terms of this Letter shall control.

In granting approval for the event, the City is consenting to the use of <u>Wicks Park</u>. In addition, the City agrees that, subject to compliance with this Letter, the City shall provide the following at its cost for the Event:

- Assistance in installing banner under City "Pallet" sign at Lake Street and Blue Star Highway. No signage may be installed as part of the Event without the City's prior approval, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld.
- Use of City owned electrical outlets/services in event location. City does not supply electrical extension cords. \*It is the responsibility of the applicant to ensure that there is adequate electrical capacity to hold the event and to obtain additional electrical supply if needed.

• 8 trash receptacles placed in the park prior to each event by the City of Saugatuck Public Works, 2 traffic cones and 2 barricades to reserve 2 spaces in the parking lot next to Wicks Park.

In exchange for the City's approval and commitments as set forth above, Applicant agrees to the following:

- Attend a pre-event planning meeting if requested by City.
- Compliance with all adopted local, county and state codes, regulations, and laws
  including applying for and obtaining any required state or county alcohol/food service
  permits.
- No later than five (5) business days prior to the Event, Applicant shall receive written approval of the Allegan County Sheriff's Office (ACSO) and the Saugatuck Township Fire District (STFD). Failure to receive written approval from the ACSO & STFD) will result in cancellation of the Event.
- Provide adequate event personnel for the safety and well-being of attendees.
- No later than five (5) business days prior to the Event, Applicant shall provide to the City Clerk a valid certificate of insurance for the Event with a minimum of \$1,000,000 per occurrence. Without limiting the foregoing, the certificate must identify the City as additional insured. All special events that involve the approved sale and consumption of alcoholic beverage must provide a liquor liability endorsement coverage limit of no less than \$1,000,000 for each occurrence. Failure to produce a valid Certificate of Insurance will result in cancellation of the Event.
- (Indemnification and Hold Harmless Provision) save, defend, reimburse, indemnify, and hold the City and its officials, employees, officers, and agents (such parties are included in the term "City" in this section), harmless from and against any liability, damages, causes of action, cost, expense (including attorney's fees), or claim that is made against the City or incurred by the City as a result of: (a) any breach of this Letter by Applicant, its agents and contractors, and others acting for or through Applicant (b) any bad act, omission, or negligence of Applicant its agents and contractors, and others acting for or through Applicant and/or (c) all claims for damages to public or private property and for injuries to persons arising out of the work, use, or presence of Applicant, and its agents and contractors, and others acting for or through Applicant, with respect to this Event.

- Return the area(s) to a condition similar to that prior to use immediately after Event. Applicant may be charged a cleanup fee if property is left in an unreasonable disorderly condition. Any damage to underground utilities or irrigation system will be responsibility of Applicant.
- The City of Saugatuck may cancel or postpone Event for any condition affecting the
  public health or safety of the city or any condition that would place parks, facilities or
  other property at risk of damage or destruction if the Event were permitted to take
  place.
